## Monmouthshire Health Walk - St. Arvan's Walk

## THE ROUTE

- 1 Cross the road from the village hall and turn left along the pavement
- 2 Turn right along Piercefield Terrace
- 3 Turn left along Grange Road
- Where Grange Road bends to the right, go straight on through a gate along a green lane, following a waymark
- Go over a stile and walk down hill to the corner of the field, keeping the wire fence on your right
- 6 Cross the stile and walk up and around the field keeping the line of trees to your right
- In front of the barns of Rogerstone Grange turn left along an unsurfaced track. Follow this to reach the corner of a small wood. Leave the track here and keep straight on with the wood on your right.
- 8 At the end of the wood, cross another track and walk slightly left across a field to a gap in the hedge with a stile
- 2 Cross over two stiles and head left across the field to a gate in the hedge where it meets the corner of a large wood
- 10 Turn sharp left here to join an unsurfaced track and follow this
- 11 The track turns right and climbs the hill
- At the T-junction, turn right towards the farm, then very soon after, turn left on a grass lane between fences - follow the waymarks
- Turn left at the T-junction, keeping the hedge on your right
- Turn right along a path with hedges at either side and over a stile onto a concrete lane; follow this to the road
- 15 Turn left and follow the pavement back into St Arvans and your starting point

## POINTS OF INTEREST

- A St Arvan was a 9th century hermit who supported himself by fishing for salmon in the River Wye. He drowned when his coracle capsized. For many years there was a stone carving of a coracle and a salmon in the church
- B The octagonal church tower was added in 1820; it was a gift of Nathaniel Wells, who lived at Piercefield House. A church warden, he was also remarkable as the son of a negro slave (his mother) from St Kitts who became Britain's first black High Sherriff (of Monmouthshire) and was also Deputy Lieutenant of the County.
- The drinking fountain was installed in 1893, when MCC decided to install drinking fountains throughout the County. Local residents raised £30 to purchase a special fountain to complement the natural beauty of the local area.
